This day the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molineux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorized by virtue of bis Majesty's Commission for declaring his Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An act for augmenting the salaries of the Lords of Session, Lords Commissioners of Justiciary, and Barons of Exchequer in Scotland, and Judges in Ireland.

An act to regulate the fees payable to coroners in Ireland, upon holding inquisitions.

An act for increasing the rates of subsistence to be paid to innkeepers and others on quartering soldiers.

An act to amend an act of the 14th year of his present Majesty, for the better regulation of buildings and

party-walls, and for the more effectually preventing mischiefs by fire within the cities of London and Westminster, by permitting John's patent tassera to be used in the covering of houses and buildings, within the places therein mentioned.

An act to amend several acts of the 13th, 35th, and 37th years of his present Majesty, for deepening and making more commodious the harbour of Aberdeen.
