WESTMINSTER—JUNE 9, 1810.

This day the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molineux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of his Majesty's Commission for declaring his Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read*; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An act for raising the sum of six millions, by exchequer bills, for the service of Great Britain for the year 1810.

An act for raising the sum of one million four hundred thousand pounds by way of annuities, for the service of Ireland.

An act for appropriating part of the surplus of the stamp duties, granted in the 48th year of his present Majesty, for defraying the charges of the loan made, and stock created, in the present session of Parliament.

An act to enable the commissioners of his Majesty's treasury to issue exchequer bills, on the credit of such aids or supplies as have been or shall be granted by Parliament for the service of Great Britain for the year 1810.

An act to explain and amend an act passed in the last session of Parliament, for continuing and making perpetual several duties of 1s. 6d. in the pound, repealed by an act of the last session of Parliament, on offices and employments of profit, and on annuities, pensions, and stipends.

An act for preventing frauds relating to the exportation of British and Irish made malt from one part of the United Kingdom to the other.

An act to revive and continue until the 25th day of March 1815, an act of the 23d year of his present Majesty, for the more effectual encouragement of the manufacture of flax and cotton in Great Britain.

An act to amend several acts for the redemption and sale of the land-tax.

An act for more effectually preventing the embezzlement of money, or securities for money, belonging to the public, by any collector, receiver, or other person intrusted with the receipt, care, or management thereof.

An act to revive and continue until the 25th day of March 1811, an act of the 39th year of his present Majesty, for the more effectual encouragement of the British fisheries.

An act for making sugar and coffee of Gaudaloupe, St Eustatia, St Martin, and Saba, liable to the same duty on importation as sugar and coffee not of the British plantations.

An act for the more effectual prevention of smuggling in the isle of Man.

An act for altering and enlarging the powers of several acts of his present Majesty, for the improvement of the town of Greenock, and the harbours thereof; for regulating the police; and for other purposes mentioned in the said acts.

And to several road, &c. acts, and 21 private acts.

We console ourselves, however, under the comfortable reflection that the great body of the people are decidedly hostile to the measures of these persons, and, we trust to the energies of government for counteracting their insidious and malignant designs.

That your Majesty's valuable life may be long preserved, as a public blessing to the nation, is our sincere and earnest prayer.
