FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE—FINAL FIGURES.

The number of animals slaughtered as diseased or exposed to infection for the period 1st January to 31st March 1961 was 23,310 and from 1st January to 30th June 1961, 24,787.

The following diseases were eradicated from Great Britain in the years indicated: Cattle plague or rinderpest (pestis-bovina, 1877; epizootic lymphangitis (lymphangitis epizootica), 1906; glanders (including farcy mass 1928; parasitic mange psoroptes et sarcoptes scabiei equi), 1948; pleuro-pneumonia (peripneumonia contagiosa boron 1898; rabies, 1922; sheep pox (variola ovium), 1850; and sheep scab (scabies ovium), 1952. Dourine (exanthema contagiosa paralyticum) has never existed in Great Britain.
