John Henderson & Sons, Solicitors, on behalf of Mr John Lorimer Blackley against the decision of the County Council, as local planning authority, refusing planning permission for the erection of 184 dwellinghouses and the construction of access roads thereto at Lochfield Farm, Dumfries.

SCHEDULE

The Order would impose unilateral waiting on Saint Andrew Street, Castle-Douglas, from Queen Street to the north end of the Town Hall, between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. Mondays to Saturdays inclusive, on the odd and even date system, with waiting limited to 30 minutes in any hour on that side of the road on which vehicles would not be prohibited from waiting for the time being.

Exceptions would be provided in the Order to enable vehicles to wait for so long as might be necessary for person to board or alight, to load or unload goods, or to be used in connection with building or demolition operations, the removal of any obstruction to traffic, or the maintenance of the road or services therein.

THE Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that They have made an Order under Sections 3(6) and 13 of the Import Duties Act, 1958, viz.: The Import Duties (Temporary Exemptions) (No. 9) Order, 1961.

This Order consolidates as at 1st January 1962, all current temporary exemptions from import duty under the Import Duties Act, 1958, and provides for certain new temporary exemptions.

In the list of temporary exemptions set out in the First Schedule, the new exemptions are marked with an asterisk and apply until 1st January 1963, unless a shorter period is indicated against any item.

In the case of items marked with a dagger † the current period of exemption is extended until the date specified.

The Order comes into operation on the 1st January 1962, and has been published as Statutory Instruments 1961, No. 2398.
