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#### PRIVY COUNCIL OFFICE

At the Court at Buckingham Palace the 22nd day of December 1964

### PRESENT,

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council

Whereas by section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act 1865 (28 & 29 Vict. c. 73) it is enacted that all pay, wages, pensions, bounty money, grants, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Her Majesty's naval or marine force to a person being or having been an officer, seaman or marine, or to the widow or any relative of a deceased officer, seaman or marine, shall be paid in such manner and subject to such restrictions, conditions and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

And whereas Her Majesty deems it expedient to amend the Order concerning pensions and other grants in cases where the disablement or death of members of the naval forces is due to ser-rice during the 1914 World War and after 2no September 1939:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred upon Her as aforesaid and of all other powers whatsoever Her thereunto enabling, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

The Order in Council dated 25th September 1964, relating to members of the naval forces as therein defined (hereinafter referred to as "the 1964 Order") shall be amended in the respects set out in the following Articles of this Order.

Higher rates of pensions and other grants under the 1964 Order

- 1.—(1) For Schedules 2, 3 (other than Part II of Table 4 thereof), 4, 6 and 7 to the 1964 Order (rates of pensions and other grants payable in respect of disablement or death due to service in the naval forces during the 1914 World War and after 2nd September 1939) there shall be substituted the Schedules set out in Part I of the Appendix hereto and numbered 2, 3, 4, 6 and 7 respectively.
- (2) Subject to the following provisions of this Article, paragraph (1) shall come into operation in relation to an officer on 1st April 1965, and in relation to a rating on 29th March, 1965 so, however, that in relation to any case in which the award is payable weekly and the said 29th March is not the normal weekly pay day, the said paragraph shall come into operation on the first normal weekly pay day after that date.
- (3) In so far as paragraph (1) of this Article substitutes the higher rates of unemployability and treatment allowances specified in paragraphs 5 and 9 of Schedule 6 in Part I of the Appendix hereto, it shall come into force on 27th January 1965.

### Amendment of Articles of the 1964 Order

2. In Articles 1, 21, 40, 41, 63 and 71 of the 1964 Order there shall be made the amendments set out in Part II of the Appendix hereto, being amendments designed to remove minor doubts.

#### PART II

#### Amendments of Articles of the 1964 Order

- 1. In Article 1 (5) (definition of adult dependant) in subparagraph (a) for the words "a person residing in the home of a member of the naval forces who is his" there shall be substituted the words "a person who resides in the home of a member of the naval forces and who is his".
- 2. In Article 21 (treatment allowances) in paragraph (6) after the words and figures "the National Insurance Acts 1946 to 1964, or" there shall be inserted the words "any benefits similar to the aforesaid benefits."
- 3. In Article 40 (pensions to parents) in paragraph (4) (a) (ii) after the words "the principal Regulations" there shall be inserted the words and figures "in force on 25th September 1949."
- 4. In Article 41 (pensions to other dependants) in paragraph (3) a (ii) after the words "the principal Regulations" there shall be inserted the words and figures "in force on 25th September 1949."
- 5. In Article 63 (refusal of treatment) in paragraph (1) for the words "it is certified" there shall be substituted the words "the Minister is satisfied."
- 6. In Article 71 (commencement and application of the Order, amendment and revocation of previous Orders, and transitional provisions) for sub-paragraph (f) of paragraph (6) there shall be substituted the following sub-paragraph:
- "(f) where a person to whom the second proviso to Article 6 (1) of the 1920 Order applied immediately before the date of its revocation is on his recovery discharged from the institution after that date, he may be granted in respect of the period during which the proviso applied to him a sum equal to that which he would have been granted had he been so discharged immediately before that date."

#### EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This Note is not part of the Order, but is intended to indicate its general purport).

This Order amends the Order of 25th September 1964. Article 1 substitutes new Tables for those contained in Schedules 2, 3, 4, 6 and 7 to the 1964 Order and has the effect of increasing—

- (a) the rates of pensions in respect of 100 per cent, disablement by £52 a year in the case of officers and by 20s. a week in the case of ratings and the rates of pensions for lower degrees of disablement and awards for cases of minor injuries and other cases of less than 20 per cent. disablement proportionately;
- (b) the rates of pensions for certain widows by £39 a year in the case of officers and by 15s. a week in the case of ratings;
- (c) the maximum rates of disablement addition on a pension basis payable to certain officers in receipt of service retired pay by £52 a year;
- (d) the normal maximum rate of an allowance payable for constant attendance from £130 a year to £143 a year in the case of officers and from 50s, a week to 55s, a week in the case of ratings, and the maximum rate for exceptional cases of very severe disablement from £260 a year to £286 a year in the case of officers and from 100s, a week to 110s, a week in the case of ratings;

- (e) the allowance for unemployable pensioners from £193 a year to £227 10s. a year in the case of officers and from 74s. a week to 87s. 6d. a week in the case of ratings;
- (f) the total additional allowance payable in respect of the wife or adult dependant of an unemployable pensioner and of a pensioner receiving treatment as defined in Article 21 (8) from £108 a year to £130 a year in the case of officers and from 41s. 6d. a week to 50s. a week in the case of ratings;
- (g) the allowances payable in respect of children of unemployable pensioners or of pensioners receiving treatment as defined in Article 21 (8) in respect of the first or only child from £52 a year to £58 10s. a year in the case of officers and from 20s. a week to 22s. 6d. a week in the case of ratings and in respect of other children from £31 6s. a year to £37 14s. a year in the case of officers and from 12s. a week to 14s. 6d. a week in the case of ratings;
- (h) the maximum allowance for lowered standard of occupation from 46s. a week to 54s. a week;
- (i) the maximum of the additional personal treatment allowance payable to a pensioner who is not entitled to full sickness benefit under National Insurance provisions from 67s. 6d. a week to 80s. a week;
- (j) the pensions payable to unmarried dependants who lived as wives of deceased members of the naval forces from £240 a year to £279 a year in the case of officers and from 82s. 6d. a week to 97s. 6d. a week in the case of ratings;
- (k) the maximum rent allowance payable to certain widows from 34s. a week to 40s. a week;
- (1) the pensions payable to certain widowers from £240 a year to £279 a year in the case of officers and from 90s, a week to 105s, a week in the case of ratings;
- (m) the allowances payable to widows in respect of children from £116 a year to £122 10s. a year in the case of officers, from £110 a year to £116 10s. a year in the case of Commissioned Officers (Branch List) and Warrant Officers and from 41s. 6d. a week to 44s. a week in the case of ratings;
- (n) the rates of pensions and allowances payable to or in respect of the children of deceased members of the naval forces (such children having become motherless or having ceased to be under the control of their mother) from £149 10s. a year to £170 10s. a year in the case of children of officers, from £116 or £141 10s. a year to £122 10s. or £162 10s. a year (according to the age of the child) in the case of children of Commissioned Officers (Branch List) and Warrant Officers and from 41s. 6d. or 54s. a week to 44s. or 62s. a week (according to the age of the child) in the case of children of ratings;
- (o) the rates of pensions payable to motherless children who, having attained the age of 18 years, are incapable of self-support by reason of infirmity which arose before they attained the normal age limit for pension purposes, from £175 10s. a year to £208 a year in the case of children of officers and from 67s. 6d. a week to 80s. a week in the case of children of ratings.

Article 2 makes amendments to the 1964 Order designed to remove minor doubts.
