The following Address has been presented to his Royal Highness the Prince-Regent, which address his Royal Highness was pleased to receive very graciously.—

To his Royal Highness **GEORGE, Prince REGENT.**

The humble address of the Magistrates and Town-Council of Greenock.

*May it please your Royal Highness,*

We, the Magistrates and Town-Council of Greenock, beg leave to present ourselves to your Royal Highness with profound respect.

Alive to the most genuine loyalty, we have not ceased to deplore his Majesty's illness, and our fervent prayers are with all humility offered to Almighty God for a recovery at once so valuable to, and so much desired by an affectionate and grateful people, and which, permit us to add, can, in our sincere persuasion, be to none an object of more solicitude and tender regard than to your Royal Highness.

Your filial reverence is most conspicuous, and must impart to your own mind the purest satisfaction.

We endeavour to appreciate the splendid example which it gives of the best affections of the heart, and we join in the approbation and praise to which it so unequivocally entitles your Royal Highness.

Distressing as the event is, to which, under the Divine Providence, we are so painfully called on to allude, we are proud to avow the consolation we feel in the important office of Regent being filled by your Royal Highness; because we are not less convinced of the admirable fitness you possess to discharge its high duties, than the nobleness of the motives which have induced you to undertake it.

Of the arduousness of the task none can at the same time be ignorant, to whom the contemplation of the political state of the world forms considerations of any regard.

Yet under the auspices of your Royal Highness we can indulge much hope; and we fondly trust no vicissitude shall ever arise to disturb the

glory and tranquillity of the British crown,—to injure or destroy the freedom of the British people.

Actuated by the just sentiments of duty, we presume to offer the declaration of our highest esteem and regard for your Royal Highness; and to express our unabated attachment to your illustrious family, to the honour and welfare of which we can never be insensible or indifferent.

Signed by our Chief Magistrate, in our name, and by our appointment; and sealed with the corporation seal, within the Council-Chamber of Greenock, this 14th day of February, in the year of our Lord 1811.

**FEBRUARY 28, 1811.**
