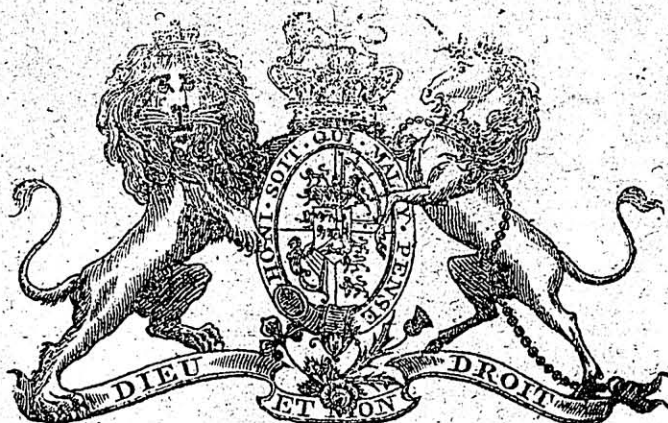

To be Sold, under the authority of an Act and Warrant of the Lords of Council and Session, occupied by the First Division of the Court, in Edinburgh, on Wednesday the 13th of November 1811, betwixt the hours of five and seven o'clock afternoon, before the Lord Ordinary on the Bills,

ALL and WHOLE the said LANDS of LONGDYKE, with the HOUSES, BIGGINGS, YARDS, MOSSES, MUIRS, MEADOWS, and haill Parts, Pencilles, and Pertinents thereof, lying within the parish of Mousewald, and sheriffdom of Dumfries.

These lands extend to 76 acres Scots, or thereby, and are situated on the turnpike road betwixt Dumfries and Annan, at the distance of 8 miles from the former, and 7 miles from the latter.
