TO THE CREDITORS OF ANN and ANN TAYLOR, Haberdashers and Milliners in Glasgow.

INTIMATION TO THE CREDITORS OF THOMAS SINCLAIR, Cattle-Dealer at Haugh of Keir.

THE Trustee on the sequestrated estate of the said Thomas Sinclair hereby intimates, that at a meeting of the Creditors, held upon the 10th current, for the purpose of choosing Commissioners, &c. the bankrupt made offer of a composition, in payment of the debts due by him preceding the sequestration, with security, payable at the term of Whitsunday first; and the meeting, on considering the offer, and the state of the bankrupt's affairs, having been of opinion that it was just and reasonable, appointed the Trustee, in terms of the statute, to call another meeting, for the purpose of deciding whether it should be accepted.
