The following Address has been presented to his Royal Highness the Prince Regent; which Address his Royal Highness was pleased to receive very graciously:

Unto his Royal Highness George Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland;

The humble Address of the Freeholders, Heritors, Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of Supply of the County of Caithness.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE the Freeholders, Heritors, Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of Supply of the County of Caithness, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness with all dutiful respect, to offer the humble tribute of our thanks at the close of a very interesting period of your administration.

At a season of unexampled difficulty, and under circumstances of peculiar embarrassment, we have seen your Royal Highness invested with the executive government of this great empire; and in the discharge of the complicated duties which arose out of that situation, we have witnessed a display of eminent qualities, which call forth at once our admiration and gratitude.

Lamenting as we do, in common with all his Majesty's subjects, that afflicting calamity which has clouded the declining years of our beloved Sovereign, we are consoled by the many proofs which your Royal Highness has given of tender solicitude for his Majesty, as well as of an anxious concern for the public welfare; and although it might be presumptuous to hope, that any approbation of ours can add to that inward satisfaction which must arise from the consciousness of having so well performed all the duties of a prince and of a son, we cannot forbear giving expression to those feelings of respect and gratitude with which they have inspired us.

We pleased then to accept the humble tribute of our grateful thanks, which is no less due to

your Royal Highness for the firmness and steadiness with which the public interests have been maintained during your administration; than for that exemplary delicacy and filial affection which would be an ornament to any station in life, and is capable of adding lustre even to the character of a prince.

The agitation of a great religious question has very much attracted our attention, and we beg leave humbly to declare to your Royal Highness, that it is our anxious wish to open to our brethren of every denomination the full enjoyment of every privilege which may be found consistent with the fundamental principles of the British constitution; we trust, however, in your Royal Highness's care, that whatever concessions may be made to any class of our fellow-subjects in these countries, it may never be forgot that our government is, by the constitution, a Protestant one, and that nothing should be done to endanger that fundamental part of it.

We further beg leave to congratulate your Royal Highness on the signal success that has attended his Majesty's arms by sea and land; and trust, that by a steady perseverance in those measures, which have raised the name of Britain high among the nations, an effectual barrier will be opposed to the further progress of the French arms on the Continent, and an instructive example held forth to the other nations of Europe, calculated to rouse them from that state of political apathy and degradation into which they have unhappily fallen.

NEW ESTABLISHMENT OF PAY AND HALF PAY FOR NAVY CHAPLAINS.

ADMIRALTY-OFFICE, London, 9th March 1812.

THE Lords Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of the united kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland, do hereby give notice, that his Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been graciously pleased, by his order in Council of the 4th instant,

in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, to direct that the following regulations, in respect to the half pay or pension to be allowed to Chaplains of his Majesty's fleet, after long and meritorious service, as well as the pay and allowances during the period of such servitude, shall be established in future, viz.

First—That every ship in his Majesty's navy, from a first to a fifth rate inclusive, shall be allowed a Chaplain on her establishment.

Secondly—That every Chaplain, after eight years of actual sea-service, (or if in a guard-ship ten years), during which period he shall not have been absent from his duty six weeks at any one time, except by special leave from the Board of Admiralty, and who shall produce certificates of good conduct and moral behaviour from the Captains he may have served under, shall be entitled to a pension in the nature of half pay; but no Chaplain to be entitled to half pay or pension if he shall accept any preferment with cure of souls during the term of his required service at sea.

Thirdly—That the amount of this pension or half pay to each Chaplain shall be 5s. per day.

Fourthly—That if, in the event of a peace, or from other circumstances not depending on himself, a Chaplain shall not have been able to complete the full servitude of eight years, a pension may be conferred by the Board of Admiralty according to a scale to be determined on, proportionate to the term of service, in no case, however, to be granted for less than three years service at sea.

Fifthly—That, on the expiration of the period of eight (or ten) years, as the case may be, every Chaplain shall give notice, in writing, whether it is his intention to continue to serve or not; in the first case, every year's additional service shall entitle him, when placed on the pension list, to receive at the rate of 6d. a-day in addition to the pension which his eight (or ten) years servitude may have entitied him to, until the aggregate rate amounts to 10s. a-day, being the greatest pension which any length of service can confer; in the second case, where no further service is intended, the pension shall remain at 5s. a-day, as above mentioned.

Sixthly—That length of service and meritorious conduct shall render Chaplains eligible to all the Chaplaincies of all naval establishments whatever, the disposal of which shall, or may be, left to the consideration of the Board of Admiralty; and that no other clergyman shall be eligible to any of those pieces of preferment than a navy Chaplain; and that the presentation to any of those pieces of preferment, whose emoluments may amount to 400l. per annum, shall cause the half pay of the respective Chaplains to cease, as is provided by law in the case of the divided living of Simonbourn.

Seventhly—That the pay of a Chaplain, while in actual service, shall be according to the following rate, viz.

One hundred and fifty pounds per annum, and the established compensation of 11l. 8s. a year for a servant, in each rate, and to have a cabin allotted for him, in the ward-room or gun-room, where he is to mess with the Lieutenants and to be rated for victuals; and when the Chaplain shall be willing to act as Schoolmaster, he shall be entitled to the bounty of 20l. a year, granted by her late Majesty Queen Anne, by her order in Council, of the 21st April 1702, provided he shall pass an examination before the Lieutenant-Governor, Professor, and Preceptor of the Royal Naval College at Portsmouth, instead of at the Trinity House, as required by the above-mentioned order in Council; and he shall be further entitled to 5l. per annum, to be paid to him by every young midshipman and volunteer of the first class, as a remuneration for his education, the same to be stopped out of the said young gentlemen's pay.

Eighthly—That a Chaplain-General shall be appointed, with such emoluments as may be deemed proper by the Board of Admiralty, to whom all applications for appointments shall be made, or will be referred, and all regulations intrusted, relating to the establishment of Chaplains for the Royal Navy, in the same manner as is practised with regard to Army Chaplains.

Ninthly—That no warrant will be granted by the Board of Admiralty, to any candidate for an appointment, unless recommended by the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, and the Bishop of London, through the Chaplain-General, as in every way properly qualified.

Tenthly—That Chaplains now serving in the Navy, who may upon due examination be deemed proper to be continued, shall be allowed the time they may have served, as part (not exceeding one half) of that required to entitle them to the pension or half-pay.
