The following Address has been presented to his Royal Highness the Prince Regent; which Address his Royal Highness was pleased to receive very graciously:

To his Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT.

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Magistrates and Town-Council of the Royal Burgh of Selkirk, in Council assem-bled, embrace this opportunity of approaching the throne with our most dutiful and sincere professions of unalterable loyalty and affectionate attachment to your Royal Highness's sacred per-

son, family, and government.

We deeply deplore the melancholy cause which deprives these kingdoms of the benevolent exer-tions of our most illustrious and beloved Sovereign; and with unfeigned sorrow we sympathize with your Royal Highness for the severe indisposition with which the best and most virtuous of Kings is now afflicted. We do, however, assure your Royal Highness, that if any thing could yield consolation to a loyal and an afflicited peo-ple, it must be the pleasure which they feel in reflecting, that the Heir of his Majesty's crown inherits the virtues of his Royal Father; virtues, which every part of your Royal Highness's conduct, during the present melancholy and trying occasion, has placed in the most conspicuous and dignified point of view. It would be presumptuous in us to particularize what we most admire; but we trust we shall be allowed to express our humble and unqualified approbation of your Royal Highness's government, and to mention the cordial satisfaction which it affords, that your Royal Highness's should travel in the footsteps of your father; should be actuated by the principles, and emulate the virtues, which have secured to his Majesty the affections of his people for

upwards of half a century.

We do most earnestly pray, that his Majesty may soon be enabled to attend the urgent concerns of his kingdoms, and personally to exercise his royal authority; and, at this eventful period, we ardently implore, that every

blessing may attend your Royal Highness's person and government.


