To his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

The humble and dutiful Address of the Noblemen, Freeholders, Justices of Peace, Commissioners of Supply, and Heritors, of the County of Peebles.

WE, his Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Noblemen, Freeholders, Justices of Peace, Commissioners of Supply, and Heritors, of the County of Peebles, humbly beg leave to approach your Royal Highness with the fervent expression of our attachment for your person, and devotion to your government, which has commenced under the most auspicious circumstances.

While the brilliant success which has crowned his Majesty's arms in the mighty contest in which Spain and Portugal are engaged with the enemy of freedom and independence, has added a fresh wreath to the laurels which already encircled the British diadem, the ardent zeal with which your Royal Highness has espoused the cause of a great and loyal people, exhibits to the world the firm assertor of the rights and liberties of mankind, treading in the same path of glory and of duty which his father so nobly trode before; and makes your country cherish the well founded hope, that the same policy which so long guided the councils of our Sovereign and proved the happiness of his people, will be the rule of a prince whose patriotic adherence to the rights and interests of the country he is now called upon to govern, will never, we are firmly persuaded, be shaken by any feelings inconsistent with the public good.

We hail as a gratifying proof of the same patriotic views, that spirit of conciliation to neutral powers, which has dictated the declaration that those restrictions on trade, rendered necessary by way of retaliation against the frantic

rage of the enemy to destroy our commerce, the pillar of our independence and naval superiority, shall cease the moment his hostile measures are withdrawn; and we trust that neutral nations will be satisfied that, while under your government, a due regard to our national rights will be maintained, the exercise of those rights will ever be tempered with a due regard to the rights of others.

While in common with the rest of his Majesty's subjects we continue to lament the severe visitation which has deprived us of that paternal government, under which for more than half a century the people of this country have hitherto been conducted in safety through these eventful times, we feel this calamity lightened, when we already see so conspicuously in the son the same zeal for the public welfare, the same views of national policy, the same adherence to those principles which placed your family on the throne, which uniformly animated our revered Sovereign; and we have the best assurance that the same paternal and patriotic government, which made him the father and the friend of his people, will continue to increase the glory and augment the happiness of the subjects of this country, and amid the overthrow of ancient thrones and the downfall of legitimate sovereigns, will rivet the attachment for your person and government, too strongly to be dissolved by any efforts of foreign policy, or acts of domestic faction.
