The following Address has been presented to his Royal Highness the Prince Regent; which Address his Royal Highness was pleased to receive very graciously.—

To his Royal Highness the PRINCE-REGENT.

The humble Address of the Noblemen, Freeholders, Justices of Peace, and Commissioners of Supply, of the County of Renfrew, assembled at Renfrew on Monday the 11th day of May 1812.

Most Gracious Prince,

WE, his Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Noblemen, Freeholders, Justices of Peace, and Commissioners of Supply, of the County of Renfrew, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness with the strongest feelings of duty and attachment to your person, and of respect for your government.

While we most deeply lament the continued indisposition of our venerable and beloved Sovereign, whose reign will ever be consecrated in the hearts of his subjects, by the inestimable blessings we enjoyed under him; we are penetrated with admiration of the memorable example of filial piety displayed by your Royal Highness, and are grateful to Divine Providence, that the sceptre, which his virtues adorned and strengthened, is placed in the hands of a prince, whose zeal for the public welfare, whose ardour in the public cause, and whose attachment to his people, we feel persuaded will not be less distinguished.

We beg leave most respectfully to congratulate your Royal Highness on the late brilliant successes that have attended his Majesty's arms, in Spain and Portugal; on the glorious achievements of an army, whose heroic valour, discipline, and enterprise, can only be equalled by the fame and splendid talents of their illustrious commander. The exalted sentiments of honour which your Royal Highness has manifested towards your allies, while they animate the hopes and direct the energies of a brave people struggling in a noble cause, excite our warmest admiration and esteem.

May the Almighty ruler of all events crown

with success your generous efforts, and while they dignify the page of history, may they consecrate your name, with your royal father's, among those princes, whose distinguished lot it has been to be the benefactors of mankind.

We feel the firmest confidence that, under your Royal Highness's auspicious rule, the glory and the prosperity of these kingdoms, the interests and the welfare of every description of the people committed to your charge, will ever be the governing principle of your ambition.
