To His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT.

May it please your Royal Highness,
WE, the Provost, Magistrates, and TownCouncil of the royal burgh of Dunfermline, in
common council assembled, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness, with every sentiment of respect and faithful attachment, to express those feelings of horror and indignation with which we are penetrated at the recent unparalleled and most atrocious assassination of the Right Hon. Spencer Perceval, First Lord Commissioner of the Treasury, and Chancellor of the Exchequer, and humbly to assure your Royal Highness of our warmest sympathy and sincere condolence on an event, by which you have been deprived of a minister of consummate worth and ability, and minister of consummate worth and ability, and the country of a statesman, whose loss, in any circumstances, must have been severely felt, but in the present most important crisis, in every point of view, is to be deplored as a great national calamity. Yet, while we lament this melancholy and awful dispensation of Providence, we feel a degree of satisfaction in reflecting, that a feel a degree of satisfaction in reflecting, that a deed so peculiarly abhorrent, appears to be the act of an individual assassin, and that the national character will not be sullied from the perpentional character will not be sullied from the perpention. tration of a crime hitherto unexampled in this happy country, and every way foreign to the get nuine disposition and honourable feeling of the British people.

Reposing the highest confidence in your Royal Highness, we look forward in the firm persuasion of your persevering in those measures which have distinguished your government with the most brilliant and important successes, and encircled the British name with additional lustre and glory; and we trust, that through the firm and determined exertions of your Royal Highness's government, in conjunction with the good sense of the country, the insidious and wicked attempts of desperate incendiaries, who, under pretence of grievances never known, and priva-

tions but partially felt, are continuing to spread the flames of anarchy and riot in several parts of the kingdom, the national tranquillity may speedily be restored; and that ultimately, through the blessing of Providence, your Royal Highness's endeavours for the re-establishment of peace, on solid and honourable principles, may be crowned with success, which, we are convinced, can only be attained by a vigorous prosecution of a just and necessary war in which the country is unhappily, though unavoidably, engaged.

The humble Address of the Magistrates and Town-Council of Greenock.

May it please your Royal Highness, WE, the Magistrates and Town-Council, in common council assembled, beg leave to present ourselves to your Royal Highness with the most

profound respect.

When on the 14th day of February 1811, we took the liberty to convey our sentiments of respect and attachment to your Royal Highness, on the important office of Regent being committed to you, and the grateful emotions, which thence arose in our minds, we had also the painful duty to perform of offering, with all humility, to your Royal Highness, our sincerest sympathy on the illness of our revered Sovereign, the continuance of which, under the divine dispensation, we, from our hearts, deeply deplore; we now presume to come before your Royal Highness in the most genuine affliction, on the recent assassination of your First Minister: an event so much beyond the possible contemplation of British feeling, that we were alike paralized by the audaciousness of its enormity, and shocked at its fatal success.

It has justly excited an universal and lively abhorrence, most honourable to the nation, and we are sensible cannot have been more poignantly felt, than in the humane breast of your Royal

Highness.
While we unaffectedly condole with your Royal Highness on so melancholy and painful an occasion, we would desire to mark with our highest value, and to cherish in the fondest remembrance, the virtues which so eminently distinguished the late Mr Perceval, and which give so peculiar an interest to his premature and lamented end.

Permit us to express to your Royal Highness our unchanged veneration for our constitution and our laws, and to avow our undiminished regard for your illustrious family.
