To his Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT. The humble Address of the Provost and Magistrates of the Royal Borough of Wick, in Common Council assembled.

WE, the Provost and Magistrates of the Royal Borough of Wick, in Common Council assembled, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness with the dutiful expression of our attachment to your person, and of congratulation on the signal successes which have recently attended his Majesty's arms and those of our allies on the Peninsula, successes no less advantageous to the country than glorious to those by whom they were achieved. We are proud to acknowledge, though unable to do justice to the consummate skill and intrepidity of the illustrious conqueror of Salamanca, whose merits are only equalled by his modesty, and whose exertions can only be compared to his success. And we trust that the day is not far distant when the complete liberation of our allies on the Peninsula will be effected; which is at once the chief aim and the best reward both of their exertions and of our own.

Although our local situation is remote from the seat of government, it neither precludes us from a participation in the blessings of the conetitution, nor renders us less sensible of their value. In common with the nation at large, we have viewed with satisfaction and with grati-tude, the unremitting exertions of your Royal Flighness, to promote the general prosperity, and restore the internal tranquillity of the country; and your sincere and persevering endeaple, to form a strong and efficient administra-tion. We trust that those servants whom you have called to your councils, will adopt such measures as the exigencies of the present eventful crisis require: that the resources of the roas try will be economically administered and

wicely applied; that abuses will be temperately and effectually remedied; and that the blessings of the constitution will be extended to our fellows which is follows as the constitution of the constitution fellow subjects of every religious persuasion, in as far as may be found consistent with the safety and welfare of the empire at large. We rely with confidence upon the wisdom of your Royal Highness, in concerting useful measures, and carrying them into effect; and the nation at large will feel, that your Royal Highness has a right to expect the gratitude and cordial assistance of all who wish well to their coun-
