A PROCLAMATION,

For a General Fast.

GEORGE, P. R.

We, taking into our most serious consideration the just and necessary war in which his Majesty is engaged, and putting our trust in Almighty God, that he will graciously bless his Majesty's arms both by sea and land, have resolved, and do, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, and by and with the advice of his Majesty's privy council, hereby command, that a public day of fasting and humiliation be observed throughout that part of the United Kingdom called Scotland, on Thursday the 11th day of March next ensuing, that so both we and his Majesty's people may humble ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain pardon of our sins, and, in the most devout and solemn manner, send up our prayers and supplications to the divine Majesty, for averting those heavy judgments which our manifold provocations have most justly deserved; and for imploring his blessing and assistance on his Majesty's arms for the restoration of peace, and prosperity to his Majesty and his dominions; and we do strictly charge and command, that the said public fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all his Majesty's loving subjects in Scotland, as they tender the favour of Almighty God, and would avoid his wrath and indignation, and upon pain of such punishment as may be justly inflicted on all such as contemn and neglect the performance of so religious and necessary a duty: Our will is, therefore, and we charge, that this our proclamation seen, ye forthwith proceed to the market cross of Edinburgh, and all other places needful, and there, in his Majesty's name and authority, make publication hereof, that none pretend ignorance: and our will and pleasure is, that his Majesty's solicitor do cause printed copies hereof to be sent to the sheriffs of the several shires,

stewarts of stewartries, and bailiffs of regalities, and their clerks, whom we ordain to see the same published; and we do appoint them to send copies hereof to the several parish churches within their bounds; and that, upon the Lord's day immediately preceding the day above mentioned, the same may be published and read from the pulpits immediately after divine service.

Given at our Court at Carleton House, this 1st day of February 1813, in the 53d year of his Majesty's reign.
