WHITEHALL—APRIL 17, 1813.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been graciously pleased, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, to constitute and appoint William Horne, Esq. Advocate, to be Sheriff-Depute of the shire of Haddington, in the room of Alexander Maconochie, Esq. appointed Solicitor-General in Scotland.

WESTMINSTER—APRIL 15, 1813.

This day the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, for declaring his Majesty's Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers, to bear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to:*

- An act for granting certain additional duties of customs imported into and exported from Great Britain.
- An act for granting to his Majesty additional duties of excise in Great Britain on tobacco and snuff, and on French wines.
- An act to alter and amend several acts passed in his present Majesty's reign relating to the redemption of the national debt; and for making further provision in respect thereof.
- An act to amend an act passed in the forty-third year of his present Majesty, for regulating the vessels carrying passengers to his Majesty's plantations and settlements abroad.
- An act to amend an act of the twenty-eighth year of his present Majesty, for allowing the importation of rum or other spirits from his Majesty's colonies or plantations in the West Indies into the province of Quebec, without payment of duty.
- An act for regulating the exportation of corn and other articles to Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, the bay of Chaleur, and the coast of Labrador.
- An act to continue, until the twenty-fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, several laws relating to the transportation of felons, and other offenders,

to temporary places of confinement in England and Scotland.

An act to repeal so much of several acts, passed in England and Scotland respectively, as empowers Justices of the Peace to rate wages, or set prices of work for artificers, labourers, or craftsmen.

An act for raising a further sum of money for the improvement of the harbour of Leith and works therewith connected.

An act for amending an act passed in the forty-first year of his present Majesty, respecting the high roads in the county of Selkirk.

An act to continue the term and alter the powers of several acts of the thirty-fourth, thirty-seventh, and forty-fifth years of his Majesty's reign, for repairing several roads in the counties of Clackmannan and Perth.

And to several English road, &c. acts, and twenty-three private acts.
