This day Lord Viscount Castlereagh, his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, exchanged with the Comte de la Chatre, duly authorized for that purpose by his Most Christian Majesty, his Royal Highness the Prince Regent's act of ratification on the part of his Majesty, of the Treaty of Peace, and of the additional articles thereunto annexed, concluded between his Majesty and his Most Christian Majesty, at Paris, on the 30th ultimo, against copies of the same duly ratified by his Most Christian Majesty Louis XVIII.

By his Royal Highness the PRINCE OF WALES, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty,

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, P. R.

Whereas a Definitive Treaty of Peace and Friendship between his Majesty and his Most Christian Majesty hath been concluded at Paris on the 30th day of May last; in conformity thereunto, we have thought fit, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, hereby to command, that the same be published throughout all his Majesty's dominions; and we do declare to all his Majesty's loving subjects our will and pleasure, that the said Treaty of Peace and Friendship be observed inviolably, as well by sea as land, and in all places whatsoever; strictly charging and commanding all his Majesty's loving subjects to take notice hereof, and to conform themselves thereunto accordingly.

Given at the Court at Carlton-House, the 17th day of June 1814, and in the 54th year of his Majesty's reign.

A PROCLAMATION,

For a Public Thanksgiving.

GEORGE, P. R.

Whereas it has pleased Almighty God, in his great goodness, to put an end to the long, extended, and bloody warfare in which we were engaged against France and her Allies; we, therefore, adoring the Divine goodness, and duly considering, that the great and public blessings of peace do call for public and solemn acknowledgments, have thought fit, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, and by and with the advice of his Majesty's privy council, to issue this proclamation, hereby appointing and commanding, that a general thanksgiving to Almighty God for these his mercies, be observed throughout that part of the United Kingdom called Scotland, upon Thursday the 7th day of July next; and we do strictly charge and command, that the said public thanksgiving be reverently and decently observed by all his Majesty's loving subjects in Scotland, on the said 7th day of July next, as they tender the favour of Almighty God, and would avoid his wrath and indignation, and upon pain of such punishment as may be justly inflicted on all such as contemn or neglect the performance of so religious a duty: Our will and pleasure is, therefore, and we charge, that this our proclamation seen, ye pass to the market-cross of Edinburgh, and all other places needful, and there, in his Majesty's name and authority, make publication thereof, that none pretend ignorance: and our will and pleasure is, that his Majesty's solicitor do cause printed copies hereof to be sent to the sheriffs of the several shires, stewards of stewartries, and bailiffs of regalities, and their clerks, whom we ordain to see the same published; and we appoint them to send copies thereof to the several parish-churches within their bounds, that, upon the Lord's day immediately preceding the day above mentioned, the same may be published and read from the pulpits immediately after divine service.

George Earl of Aberdeen, Knight of the Most Ancient Order of the Thistle, and the heirs-male of his body lawfully begotten, by the name, style, and title of Viscount Gordon of Aberdeen, in the county of Aberdeen.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has also been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, to grant the dignity of a Baron of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, unto the Hon. Sir Charles William Stewart, Knight of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, and Lieutenant-General of his Majesty's forces, and the heirs-male of his body lawfully begotten, by the name, style, and title of Baron Stewart of Stewarts Court, and of Ballilawn, in the county of Donegal.

OXFORD—JUNE 13, 1814.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent was this day pleased, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, to confer the honour of Knighthood on Joseph Lock, Esq. Mayor of Oxford.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent was this day also pleased, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, to confer the honour of Knighthood on Elias Taunton, Esq. of that city.
