HIS Royal Highness the Prince Regent having had under his consideration, the recommendation of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty for granting an increase in the rates of Half Pay to the Officers of the Royal Marines, who shall be reduced on the formation of a Peace Establishment, or who have been placed on Half Pay in the course of the War, on account of Wounds, or of Infirmities contracted upon Service;—His Royal Highness was pleased in the name and on the behalf of the King, and by and with the advice of his Majesty's Privy Council, to approve of the following Scale, to commence from the 30th June 1814.
