His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, has been graciously pleased to order a writ to be issued, under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, for summoning Sir Cecil Bishopp, of Parham Park, in the county of Sussex, Baronet, up to the House of Peers, by the name, style, and title of Baron Zouche, of Haryngworth, he being lineally descended from the eldest of the two daughters of Edward the last Lord Zouche, of Haryngworth, who died without issue-male in 1625, and one of the rightful heirs of the said Barony, which was created by writ of summons in the reign of King Edward the Second.
