THE following Address has been presented to his Royal Highness the Prince Regent; which Address his Royal Highness was pleased to receive very graciously:

Unto his Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

The humble and dutiful Address of the Right Honourable the Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Council of the City of Edinburgh.

WE, his Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Council of the City of Edinburgh, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness with sentiments of the warmest affection to your royal person, and, with the most profound respect, to offer our congratulations on the splendid and decisive victory with which it hath pleased Almighty God to crown the exertions of his Majesty's arms.

We have seen with indignation an unprincipled usurper, in defiance of a solemn treaty, attempt to re-assume that empire which he had abdicated, and endeavour to satiate the rapacity of a perjured army, by renewing those scenes of devastation by which he had formerly laid waste the Continent of Europe.

The heroic achievements of the British army, led on by the immortal Wellington, have confounded the gigantic plans of the presumptuous adventurer, have replaced the legitimate sovereign on the throne of France, and opened up the prospect of returning peace to heal the wounds of the afflicted nations of Europe.

It is with exulting hearts that we congratulate your Royal Highness that the line of politics, for so many years pursued by the government of this country, and acted upon in the late emergency with increased vigour, has afforded to our heroic countrymen an opportunity of displaying a gallantry hitherto unparalleled, and of raising Great Britain to the first rank among the nations.

We venerate the Sovereign, crowned with years and glory, under whose paternal care the noble career of triumph was begun. We contemplate with the pride of conscious freedom your Royal Highness maintaining the rights, establishing the privileges, and thus animating the exertions and advancing the

happiness of your brave and loyal people, who will ever reflect with satisfaction on the dignified attitude which the British empire has attained under your Royal Highness's government.

That the life of your Royal Highness may be long preserved is the earnest prayer of your Royal Highness's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Council of the City of Edinburgh.
