WESTMINSTER—FEBRUARY 26, 1816.

This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Deputy Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, for declaring his Majesty's Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An act to revive and continue, until the 25th day of March 1818, several laws relating to the duties on glass made in Great Britain.

An act to revive and further continue, until the 25th day of March 1817, an act of the 7th year of King George the Second, for the free importation of cochineal and indigo. And one private act.
