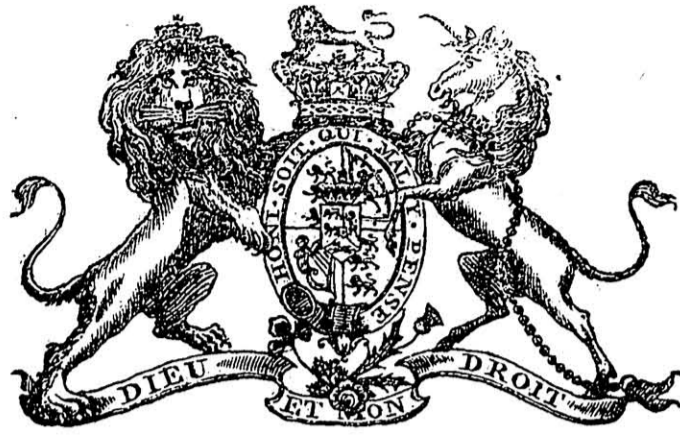

To his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

The humble Address of the Noblemen, Gentlemen, Lieutenancy, Freeholders, Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of Supply of the County of Banff.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, his Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Noblemen, Gentlemen, Lieutenancy, Freeholders, Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of Supply of the County of Banff, beg leave to approach the throne with our most cordial congratulations on the marriage of your illustrious daughter, her Royal Highness the Princess Charlotte Augusta, with his Serene Highness Leopold George Frederick, Prince of Cobourg.

We rejoice on all occasions which contribute to the happiness of your Royal Highness, and every branch of your august family; and we hail this auspicious alliance as an event which, from the high character and distinguished qualities of his Serene Highness, and the estimable and kindred virtues of his Royal Bride, affords the surest presage of domestic felicity to the illustrious pair.

We contemplate this propitious union as beneficial to the best interest of the British empire. Whatever tends to secure to our country the Protestant succession of your illustrious race on the throne of their ancestors, must always form a material portion of the happiness of his Majesty's loyal subjects.

That his Serene Highness and his Royal Consort may enjoy for many years all the blessings of the connubial state, and that your Royal Highness may long live to witness and participate their happiness, are our fervent wish and prayer.

To his Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT.
Most gracious Prince.

WE, his Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Common Council of the City of Glasgow, humbly approach the Throne, with our warmest congratulations on the recent auspicious nuptials of your illustrious daughter, the Princess Charlotte Augusta, with his Serene Highness, Leopold George Frederick, Prince of Cobourg.

While we earnestly desire and pray, that the peculiar favour of Heaven may attend this exalted union, we beg leave to express the high sense we entertain of the importance of an alliance, which is not more grateful to the personal feelings of your Royal Highness, and of the other members of your august family, than it is congenial to the wishes and conducive to the interests of your people; an alliance which affords, under Divine Providence, an additional security for the permanence of our invaluable Constitution in Church and State, as established at the Revolution.

On such a joyful occasion we feel peculiar satisfaction in renewing, along with our fellow subjects, the assurances of our loyal zeal, and of our firm attachment to our venerable King, to your Royal Highness, and to the other branches of the House of Hanover, under whose mild, paternal, and enlightened government, the people of these realms have enjoyed a greater portion of happiness and prosperity than has fallen to the lot of any other nation.

WESTMINSTER—MAY 31, 1816.

This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Deputy Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized*

by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, for declaring his Majesty's Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers, to bear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An act to repeal the duties, allowances, and drawbacks of Excise on hard soap made in Great Britain and imported from Ireland, and to grant other duties, allowances, and drawbacks in lieu thereof.

An act for making certain allowances of the duties payable on malt and beer.

An act for defraying the charge of the pay and clothing of the local militia in Great Britain, to the 25th day of March 1817.

An act to continue the term and enlarge the powers of several acts, for imposing and continuing a duty of two pennies Scots, or a sixth part of a penny sterling, upon every Scots pint of ale and beer which shall be brewed for sale, brought into, tapped, or sold within the town of Borrowstownness and liberties thereof, in the county of Linlithgow, and for extending the same over the parish of Borrowstownness; for repairing the harbour of the said town; and for other purposes therein mentioned.

An act for altering and amending several acts, in regard to the duty of two pennies Scots upon every pint of ale and beer sold in the city of Edinburgh, and places adjacent.

An act for enlarging the terms and powers of several acts, for laying a duty of two pennies Scots, or one sixth part of a penny sterling, upon every pint of ale or beer vended or sold within the town of Montrose and privileges thereof; for supplying the said town with fresh water; and for other purposes therein mentioned.

An act to enable the Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Council of the city of Edinburgh, to carry into effect certain purposes in regard to the erection of a chapel at the west end of Princes Street; and for effecting certain improvements in the neighbourhood thereof, and in other parts of the extended royalty of the said city.

An act to alter and amend two acts of the fifty-third and fifty-fourth years of his present Majesty, for erecting and maintaining a new gaol and other buildings for the county and city of Edinburgh; and to alter and amend two acts of the forty-third and forty-ninth years of his present Majesty, in regard to the statute labour of the middle district of the said county.
