The following Address has been presented to his Royal Highness the Prince Regent; which Address his Royal Highness was pleased to receive very graciously:
To his Royal Highness George Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

May it please your Royal Highness,
WE, his Majesty's most loyal and dutiful subjects, the Freeholders, Commissioners of Supply, Justices of Peace, Clergy and others, Heritors and Inhabitants, of the County of Orkney, in general meeting assembled, beg leave humbly to approach your Royal Highness, and to make offer of our sentiments of sincere condolence on the late melancholy event, which has at once deprived your Royal Highness of a beloved daughter, and disappointed the nation of its dearest hopes.

Under the pressure of so severe an affliction it will doubtless be no small source of consolation to your Royal Highness, that the whole nation participates in those feelings of sympathy so suitable to the occasion, and so universally embrace the opportunity of mingling their expressions of loyalty with their grief.

In these sentiments we presume to assure your Royal Highness that we most cordially join; and that though remote in situation we are not the less attached to your august house, nor less feelingly alive to whatever may affect your happiness, or the prosperity of the nation over which you have been called by Providence to rule.

This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by the*

Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, for declaring his Majesty's Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers, to bear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An act for continuing to his Majesty certain duties on malt, sugar, tobacco, and snuff, in Great Britain, and on pensions, offices, and personal estates, in England; for the service of the year 1818.

An act for raising the sum of 80,000,000 by Exchequer bills, for the service of the year 1818.
