At the Council-Chamber, Whitehall, the 18th of November 1818,

PRESENT, Archbishop of Canterbury, Lord President, Duke of Montrose, Earl Bathurst, Earl of Liverpool, Viscount Melville. Viscount Sidmouth,

Bishop of London. Lord St Helens, Sir William Scott, Sir John Nicholl, Mr Chancellor of the Exchequer, Lord Chief Baron.

In pursuance of an act passed in the 10th year of her late Majesty Queen Anne, and of another act passed in the 32d year of his present Majesty, wherein provision is made for praying for the Royal Family in that part of Great Britain called Scotland; it is hereby ordered in Council, that henceforth every Minister and Preacher shall in his respective Church, Congregation, or Assembly, pray in express words,

For his Most Sacred Majesty King George, their Royal Highnesses George Prince of Wales, the Princess of Wales, and all the Royal Family.

Of which all persons concerned are hereby required to take notice, and govern themselves accord-
