Whereas in the act of uniformity, which establishes the Liturgy of the Church of England, provision is made for such alterations in the prayers for the Royal Family, as from time to time shall become necessary, and he directed by lawful authority; his Majesty was pleased this day, in Council, to declare his royal will and pleasure, that in the prayer for the Royal Family in the morning and evening service, the words, "Their Royal Highnesses George Prince of Wales, the Princess of Wales, and," be omitted.

That the same omission take place in that part of the litany or general supplication in which the same words recur.

That in the title to the form of prayer to be used on the day of his Majesty's accession to the crown, the words, "Upon the twenty-fifth day of October," be struck out, and the words, "Upon the twenty-ninth day of January," be inserted.

That in the prayer found in this service for the King and Royal Family, the words, "Their Royal Highnesses George Prince of Wales, the Princess of Wales, and," be omitted.

And his Majesty doth strictly charge and com-

mand, that no edition of the common prayer be from henceforth printed, but with this amendment; and that in the meantime, till copies of such edition may be had, all Parsons, Vicars, and Curates, within this realm, do, (for preventing of mistakes), with the pen, correct and amend all such prayers in their church books, according to the foregoing direction; and for the better notice hereof, that this order be forthwith printed and published, and sent to the several parishes; and that the Right Reverend the Bishops do take care that obedience be paid to the same accordingly.
