THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal; signed by his Majesty, for declaring his Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to eclare and notify the Royal Assent to the said acts,

Fread accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to In act for enabling his Majesty to settle annuities upon ain branches of the royal family, in lieu of annuities which a ceased upon the demise of his late Majesty. An act for applying certain monies therein mentioned for service of the year 1820, and for further appropriating is supplies granted in this session of Parliament.
