WHITEHALL—FEBRUARY 24, 1821

The King has been pleased to command that, in the present and in all future years, his Majesty's Birth-day shall be, in all respects, observed and kept on the 23d day of April; excepting when that day shall fall on Sunday; in which case the same is to be observed and kept on the following day.

At the Court at Carlton-House, the 23d February 1821,

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. This day the Right Honourable James Marquis of Graham, Vice-Chamberlain of his Majesty's Household, was, by his Majesty's command, sworn his Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took his place at the Board accordingly.

CARLTON-HOUSE—FEBRUARY 23, 1821.

This day his Excellency the Count de Lieven, Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from the Emperor of all the Russias; his Excellency Duke de Frias and Uceda, Ambassador Ordinary and Plenipotentiary from the King of Spain; and Baron Just, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of Saxony, presented audiences respectively of his Majesty to receive letters from their sovereigns; to which they were severally introduced by Lord Viscount Castlereagh, his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and conducted by Sir Robert Chester, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

FEBRUARY 23, 1821.

The King was this day pleased to confer the honour of Knighthood upon Alexander Wood, Esq. Knight Commander of the most distinguished Order of St Michael and St George of the Ionian Islands.

WESTMINSTER—FEBRUARY 23, 1821.

This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by his Majesty, for declaring his Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read;* and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An act for enabling his Majesty to make provision for her Majesty the Queen.

An act for continuing to his Majesty certain duties on malt, sugar, tobacco, and snuff, foreign spirits and sweets in Great Britain, and on pensions, offices, and personal estates in England, for the service of the year 1821.

An act for applying certain monies therein mentioned for the service of the year 1821.

An act to amend an act of the 58th year of his late Majesty, for more effectually discovering the Longitude at Sea, and encouraging attempts to find a northern passage between the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans, and to approach the Northern Pole.

And to one English Act.
