## CARLTON-HOUSE—MARCH 21, 1821.

This day his Excellency the Duke de Frias and Uceda, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from the King of the Spains, had a private audience of his Majesty to deliver a letter from his Sovereign; to which he was introduced by Lord Viscount Castlereagh, his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign affairs, and conducted by Sir Robert Chester, Knight, Master of the Ceremonies.
