WHITEHALL—JUNE 25, 1822.

The King has been pleased to appoint Mr. William McCaa to be Commissary of the Commissariat of Kirkcudbright, vacant by the death of Mr John Thomson.

WESTMINSTER—JUNE 24, 1822.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by his Majesty, for declaring his Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read;* and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An act to reduce the duty of excise on malt made in Ireland, and certain drawbacks in respect thereof.

An act for the encouragement of navigation and commerce, by regulating the importation of goods and merchandize; so far as relates to the countries or places from whence, and the ships in which such importation shall be made.

An act to regulate the trade between his Majesty's possessions in America and the West Indies, and other places in America and the West Indies.

An act to regulate the trade between his Majesty's possessions in America and the West Indies, and other parts of the world.

An act to repeal an act of his present Majesty, for explaining an act, made in the 12th year of Queen Anne, to reduce the rate of interest, without prejudice to Parliamentary securities, and to substitute other provisions in lieu thereof.

An act to repeal divers ancient statutes and parts of statutes, so far as they relate to the importation and exportation of goods and merchandize from and to foreign countries.

An act to repeal certain acts, and part of acts, relating to the importation of goods and merchandize.

An act to extend the powers of the Commissioners appointed by an act passed in the last session of Parliament, for inquiring into the collection and management of the revenue in Ireland.

An act for the further and more adequate punishment of persons convicted of manslaughter, and of servants convicted of robbing their masters, and of accessories before the fact to grand larceny and other felonies.

An act for preventing frauds upon Creditors by secret warrants of attorney to confess judgment.

An act for the more speedy recovery of debts, penalties, and forfeitures, and recognisances estreated.

An act to alter, amend, and enlarge the term and powers of an act passed in the 59th year of his late Majesty, for erecting and maintaining ferries across the river Tay, in the counties of Fife and Forfar.

An act for watching, cleansing, and lighting the streets of the city of Edinburgh and adjoining districts, for regulating the police thereof, and for other purposes relating thereto.

An act to enlarge and amend an act of his late Majesty, for lighting the city and suburbs of Glasgow with gas.

An act to amend an act of the 43d year of his late Majesty, for paving, cleansing, and lighting the town of Alloa, and for other purposes therein mentioned.

And to several English and Irish acts, and twenty-two private acts.
