PRESENT.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas, by an act passed in the 56th year of his late Majesty's reign, cap. 38, intituled "An act to empower his Majesty to suspend the ballot or enrolment for the local militia," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for his Majesty, by any order in Council, to direct that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia shall take place; but that such ballot and enrolment shall remain and continue suspended for the period specified in any such order of Council, and from time to time, by any like order or orders in Council, to continue such suspension so long as his Majesty shall deem the same expedient, any thing in any act or acts of Parliament to the contrary notwithstanding: and whereas it is deemed expedient that the ballot and enrolment for the local militia should be suspended for the space of one year; it is, therefore, ordered by his Majesty, by and with the advice of his Privy Council, that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia do take place for the space of one year from and after the date hereof, but that the ballot and enrolment for the local militia be suspended for the space of one year from the date of this order.

FIRST INTIMATION.
