WHITEHALL—July 13, 1822.

WESTMINSTER—July 15, 1822.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by his Majesty, for declaring his Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read;* and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An act to regulate the performance of certain contracts, and to authorize the Courts of Chancery and Exchequer to make orders in cases which may arise out of the conversion of certain annuities of five pounds per centum per annum into annuities of four pounds per centum per annum; and for paying of such proprietors of five pounds per centum annuities as shall dissent from receiving four pounds per centum annuities in lieu thereof.
