Extract of a Dispatch from Brook Taylor, Esq. his Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the Court of Bavaria, to the Marquess of Londonderry, his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, dated Hanover, July 19, 1822.

It is with the greatest satisfaction that I have to acquaint your Lordship with the safe delivery of her Royal Highness the Duchess of Cambridge, at eight o'clock this morning, of a Princess, at the Palace of Montbrillant, near Hanover. Your Lordship will be happy to learn at the same time, that both her Royal Highness and her Child are doing well.
