WESTMINSTER—MAY 12, 1823.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by his Majesty, for declaring his Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read;* and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An act to make more effectual provision, for permitting goods imported to be secured in warehouses or other places without payment of duty on the first entry thereof.

An act for regulating the number of apprentices to be taken on board British merchant vessels, and for preventing the desertion of seamen therefrom.

An act to enable the Edinburgh and Glasgow Union Canal Company to borrow a further sum of money.

An act for continuing the term and powers of an act, passed in the forty-second year of the reign of his late Majesty King George the Third, for repealing an act for repairing the highways and bridges in the county of Wigtown, and for other purposes in the said act mentioned.

And several English and three private acts.
