in commemoration of the distinguished gallantry displayed by the Regiment in the assault and capture of that town, in the month of January 1807.

His Majesty has also been pleased to approve of the 87th Foot bearing on its colours and appointments, the words

"Talavera,"  
"Vittoria,"  
"Nivelle,"  
"Orthes,"  
"Toulouse."

In commemoration of the distinguished conduct of the late 2d Battalion of the Regiment at the battle of Talavera, on 28th July 1809; at Vittoria, on 21st June 1813; at Nivelle, on 10th November 1813; at Orthes, on 27th February 1814; and in the attack of the position covering Toulouse, on 10th April 1814.

1st Royal Veteran Battalion—Lieutenant Leeson Paterson, from half-pay 57th foot, to be Lieutenant, vice Mayes, appointed to the 95th foot. Dated January 15.

Major-General Sir Frederick Adam, K. C. B. to have the local rank of Lieutenant-General in the Ionian Islands. Dated February 10.
