WESTMINSTER, JUNE 3, 1824.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by His Majesty, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An act for allowing persons to compound for their assessed taxes for the remainder of the periods of composition limited by former acts, and for granting relief in certain cases.

An act to authorize the issuing the Exchequer bills for the payment of the proprietors of four pounds per centum annuities in England and Ireland, who have not signified their assents under the acts passed in this session, for transferring such annuities into reduced annuities of three pounds ten shillings per centum.

An act to permit the mutual transfer of capital, in certain public stock or funds, transferable at the banks of England and Ireland respectively.

An act to alter the laws relating to the duties on the importation and the prohibitions on the exportation of wool of hare and coney skins.

An act to enable the commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury to sell out certain bank annuities now standing in their names, and to apply the produce thereof in part payment of a loan of three hundred thousand pounds due to the Royal Exchange Assurance Company, and to facilitate the sales of fee farm rents, and of small portions of the land revenue of the Crown, and for other purposes.

An act for maintaining the harbour of the burgh of Dingwall, and regulating the police of the said burgh.

An act for making and maintaining a road from the city of Glasgow to the village of Parkhead.

And several English, and five private acts.

May 4.

An act to repeal the duties on licences to brew and to retail beer, spirituous liquors, and foreign wine, and to grant other duties in lieu thereof, and amend the laws of excise relating to such duties, and to brewers and retailers of beer.

An act for more effectually making and repairing the road from the city of Glasgow to Yoker-bridge, and certain roads communicating therewith.

And three English acts.

WHITEHALL, JUNE 8, 1824.

The King has been pleased to order a congé d'elire to pass the Great Seal, empowering the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Chester to elect a Bishop of that See, the same being void by the translation of the Right Reverend Father in God George Henry, late Bishop thereof, to the See of Bath and Wals; and His Majesty has also been pleased to recommend to the said Dean and Chapter, the Reverend Charles James Blomfield, Doctor in Divinity, to be by them elected Bishop of the said See of Chester.
