These lands are situated on the east side of Lochfine, and very convenient for the herring-fishery, having good harbours for boats and vessels. They are immediately opposite to the eastern entrance to the Crinan Canal, and within a short distance of the village of Lochgilphead. They are distant from Inveraray 25 miles, from Greenock about 20, and from Rothesay 12 miles, to and from which several places there are regular conveyances by packet-boats and steam-boats; and as steam-boats ply between Glasgow and Fort-William, through the Crinan Canal, the access from east and west is perfectly easy and commodious. The lands abound in limestone, and consist of nearly nineteen hundred Scots acres, whereof the greater portion is arable land of excellent quality, and green pasture superior to any in that neighbourhood. They are enclosed by stone-dikes, and the farm-houses, some of which were built within these few years, are substantial, and in good order. The public road to Inveraray passes through the property, and there are several fine situations for building.
