WESTMINSTER, May 20, 1825.

**T**HIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by His Majesty, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read*; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An act for defining the rights of capital convicts who receive pardon, and of convicts after having been punished for clergyable felonies, for placing clerks in orders on the same footing with other persons as to felonies, and for limiting the effect of the benefit of clergy.

An act to regulate the qualification and the manner of enrolling Jurors in Scotland, and of choosing Jurors on criminal trials there, and to unite counties for the purposes of trial in cases of high treason in Scotland.

An act for the better regulation of the Sheriff and Stewards and Burgh Courts of Scotland.

An act for the more easy recovery of small debts in the Sheriff Courts in Scotland.

An act for improving and maintaining the harbour of the burgh of barony of Stonehaven, in the county of Kincardine, and the entrance thereto, and rendering more convenient and commodious the streets and avenues leading to the same.

An act for building a bridge over the river Don, near the village of Balgowrie, or Polgowrie, in the parish of Old Machar, and county of Aberdeen.

An act to alter and amend two acts of the fifty-fourth and fifty-ninth years of His late Majesty for erecting and maintaining a new court-house and other offices for the city and county of Aberdeen, and for providing an additional gaol for the said city and county, and to provide a safe and convenient place for the custody and preservation of the public records of the said city and county, and for other purposes connected therewith.
