HIS Majesty's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by his Majesty's Order in Council of the nineteenth of July last, directed, that all ships or vessels liable to quarantine, as are or shall be bound to the northern ports of Scotland, shall perform their quarantine at Cromarty-Bay, and that such of them as are or shall be bound to the south west ports of Scotland, shall perform their quarantine at Carsthorn; it is hereby ordered by his Majesty, by and with the advice of his Privy Council, that so much of the said Order in Council as relates to the performance of quarantine at Cromarty-Bay and Carsthorn, be, and the same is hereby, revoked; and His Majesty is pleased to order, by and with the advice aforesaid, that all ships or vessels as are or shall be bound to the northern ports of Scotland, comprehending the

Inverness, Caithness,
Zetland, and
Orkney, Stornaway,

to any member, creek, or other place belonging to within any or either of the above ports, shall perform their quarantine at Inverkeithing-Bay; that such ships or vessels as are or shall be bound to the south west ports of Scotland, comprehending the ports of

Dumfries and
Kirkcudbright,

to any member, creek, or other place belonging to within either of the above ports, shall perform their quarantine at Holy Lock, in the Firth of Clyde.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.
