WESTMINSTER, May 5, 1826.

HIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by His Majesty, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Arch-bishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An act for funding eight millions of Exchequer Bills.

An act to enable persons to continue their compositions for assessed taxes for further periods, and for allowing persons who have not compounded to enter into composition for a limited term.

An act to amend the several acts for authorising advances for carrying on public works, and to extend the provisions thereof, in certain cases.

An act to defray the charge of pay, clothing, and contin-cent and other expences of the disembodied militia in Great Britain and Ireland, and to grant allowances, in certain cases, to subaltern officers, adjutants, quartermasters, surgeons, assistant-surgeons, surgeons'-mates, and serjeant-majors of militia until the twenty-fifth day of March one thou-sand eight hundred and twenty-seven.

An act to amend an act, passed in the fifty-second year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, so far as the same relates to the retired allowances of quartermasters of cavalry and infantry.

An act to repeal the duties and drawbacks of Excise upon tawed kid skins, sheep skins, and lamb skins.

An act to enable Commissioners for trying offences upon

the sea, and Justices of the Peace to take examinations touching such offences, and to commit to safe custody persons charged therewith.

An act to make further regulations relating to the licens-

ing of stage coaches.

An act to continue, until the 5th day of July one thound eight hundred and twenty-eight, ing private distillation in Scotland.'

An act to amend an act for suppressing or regulating cer-tain offices therein mentioned, so far as relates to the Board

An act for erecting and maintaining a harbour, and works connected therewith, in the Firth of Cromarty, at or near

An act for further improving the communication between the counties of Edinburgh and Fife, by the ferries, across the frith of Forth, between Leith and Newhaven, and Kinghorn, Burntisland, and Dysart.

An act to amend an act for opening a street from the

Cross of Glasgow to Monteith-row. An act for regulating and converting the statute labour in the county of Kinross, and for more effectually making

and repairing the highways within the said county.
