WESTMINSTER, April 12, 1827.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by His Majesty, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read*; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for applying certain sums of money for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty-seven.

An Act to indemnify such persons in the United Kingdom as have omitted to qualify themselves for offices and employments, and for extending the time limited for those purposes respectively.

An Act for declaring the law, in relation to bills of exchange and promissory notes becoming payable on Good Friday or Christmas Day.

An Act to remove doubts as to the validity of life annuities granted or purchased by the Sun Fire-Office Company.

And several English and two private Acts.
