THE HISTORY OF THE UNITED STATES

CHAPTER I
THE EARLY HISTORY OF THE UNITED STATES
The first European settlement in North America was established by the English in 1607 at Jamestown, Virginia. This was followed by the Pilgrims in 1620 at Plymouth, Massachusetts. The French also established settlements in the Mississippi Valley and the Great Lakes region. The Spanish had colonies in the Southwest and Florida. The Dutch had a colony in New York. The Swedish had a colony in Delaware. The Danish had a colony in Greenland. The British colonies grew in number and size, leading to the American Revolution in 1776.
