At the Court at *St. James's*, the 30th day of *June* 1827,

PRESENT,

The KING'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THIS day the Right Honourable Stephen Rumbold Lushington was, by His Majesty's command, sworn of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took his place at the Board accordingly.

This day, in pursuance of His Majesty's pleasure, John Bazeley, Esq. was promoted to be Vice-Admiral of the Blue, taking rank next after Vice-Admiral William Nowell; and Shuldham Peard, Esq. and Man Dobson, Esq. to be Rear-Admirals of the Red, the former taking rank next after Rear-Admiral William Windham, and the latter next after Rear-Admiral Robert Dudley Oliver.

LEGACY OF £1,000.

WHEREAS by an Order of the High Court of Chancery, made in a cause wherein His Majesty's Attorney General is Informant, and DOROTHY ELIZABETH BOEHM and Others are Defendants; bearing date the 28th day of March 1827; it was ordered, that it should be referred to James William Farrer, Esquire, one of the Masters of the said Court, to enquire whether WILLIAM STEWART LEAMY, described in the Will of WILLIAM LEAMY, (formerly of Madras in the East Indies, afterwards of Charlotte Street, Portland Place, and afterwards of the Island of Madeira, Esquire, the Testator in the pleadings of the said cause named), as of or near Edinburgh, and Captain JOHN BURN, in the said Will also described as a Prisoner in Verdun, in France, was or were living or dead, or at what time, or times they or either of them so died, and whether the legacies of £1,000 and £200 respectively bequeathed to them by the said Testator's Will, was or were lapsed, or who was or were the personal representative or representatives of them or either of them. Now, in pursuance of the said Order, the said William Stewart Leamy and Captain John Burn respectively, or if deceased, their personal representatives, are, on or before the 2d day of August 1827, to come in before the said Master at his chambers in Southampton Buildings, Chancery Lane, London; or in default thereof they will be peremptorily excluded the benefit of the said Order.
