At the Court at Windsor, the 3d day of September 1827,

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of His present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make provision for ascertaining from time to time the average prices of British corn," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that for the purpose of ascertaining the average price of corn and grain sold within the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, by any Order or Orders to be by him made, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to direct that the provisions of the said Act, so far as regards the appointment of inspectors and the making of weekly returns, shall be applicable to any cities or towns within the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, which shall be named in any such Order or Orders in Council;" and it is thereby provided, "that the returns so received from such towns shall not be admitted into the averages made up for the purpose of regulating the bringing into home consumption foreign corn, grain, meal, or flour:"

His Majesty, in pursuance of the said Act, and in exercise of the powers and authorities thereby vested in him as aforesaid, was this day pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the provisions of the said Act, so far as respects the appointment of inspectors, and the making of weekly returns, shall be applicable to the several cities and towns hereinafter-mentioned, that is to say;
