**I**T is this day ordered by His Majesty in Council, that the Parliament be prorogued from Thursday the twenty-eighth day of this instant August, to Thursday the thirtieth day of October next.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the fifty-sixth year of His late Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to empower His Majesty to suspend the ballot or enrolment for the local militia," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by any Order in Council, to direct that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia shall take place, but that such ballot and enrolment shall remain and continue suspended for the period specified in any such Order in Council, and from time to time by any like Order or Orders in Council, to continue such suspension so long as His Majesty shall deem the same expedient, any thing in any Act or Acts of Parliament to the contrary notwithstanding; and whereas by an Order in Council,

made the thirtieth of June one thousand eight hundred and twenty-seven, it was ordered by His Majesty in Council, that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia should take place for the space of one year from the sixteenth of July one thousand eight hundred and twenty-seven, but that the ballot should remain and continue suspended for the space of one year from the said sixteenth of July; and whereas it is deemed expedient to continue such suspension of the ballot and enrolment for the local militia for the space of one year from and after the sixteenth day of July in this year; it is, therefore, ordered by His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia do take place for the space of one year from and after the sixteenth day of July in this year, but that the ballot or enrolment for the local militia do remain and continue suspended, for the space of one year from and after the sixteenth day of July next.

**N**OTICE is hereby given, that a Claim has been entered in the said High Court, in behalf of Messrs. **CORDES** and **GROUDEMAYER**, of Hamburg, Merchants, and of their Attorney, claiming the proceeds of 118 bundles, containing 236 Salted Hides, part of the Cargo of the Prussian Brigantine "Stettin," Jacob Runke Jacobs, Master, which was captured and brought into Leith by His Britannic Majesty's Sloop of War called the *Cobourg*, commanded by Lieutenant *Terence O'Neill*, in the month of April 1799, and which Salted Hides were sold under authority of the Judge of the said High Court, by a warrant dated the 6th August 1799.

After a long litigation in the Courts of Scotland, and in the House of Lords, the Cargo in question was adjudged to *Cordes* and *Groudemayer* as neutral property; but the price of the Hides, which had been previously sold by order of the Judge Admiral, and were, for reasons unknown, not then delivered to them, was deposited in Bank, for behoof of those interested, where it still remains.

All persons having, or pretending to have interest in the said Hides, or proceeds thereof, are hereby required to enter their claims for the same in the said High Court of Admiralty in Scotland, on or before the 12th November next, with certification.
