His Majesty most earnestly recommends to you to enter upon the consideration of a subject of such paramount importance, deeply interesting to the best feelings of His people, and involving the tran-quillity and concord of the United Kingdom, with the temper and the moderation which will best ensure the successful issue of your deliberations.
