## TARBETNESS LIGHTHOUSE.

PETHE COMMISSIONERS of the NORTHERN LIGHTHOUSES hereby give Notice, that a LIGHTHOUSE has been erected upon TARBETNESS, in the Moray Frith, the Light of which will be exhibited on the night of Friday the 29th day of January current, and every night thereafter, from the going away of daylight in the evening, till the return of daylight in the

The following is a Specification of the position of the Light house, and the appearance of the Light, by Mr. Stevenson, Engineer to the Commissioners. .

TARBETNESS forms the North-eastern extremity of Cromartyshire, situate in lat. 57° 54° north, and in long. 3° 47° west—distant about 12 miles from the entrance to Cromarty Frith. By Compass, the Lighthouse bears from the sunken rocks called the Three Kings and the King's Sons, N.E. ½ E. distant 9 miles; from Halliman's Scares, lying off Covesea or Cowsey Point, N.N.W. ½ W. distant 18 miles; from Clythness S.W. by W. ½ W. distant 31 miles; and from Culloden Rock W. by S. distant one mile. Tarbetness Light will be known to Mariners as an Intermittent Light, suddenly appearing like a Star of the first magnitude, and continuing in view 2½ minutes, when it is suddenly eclipsed for half a minute; thus producing its characteristic effect once in every three minutes. It must, however, be observed, that within the Moray Frith, in a south-westerly direction from Tarbetness, where the Light cannot be mistaken for any other on the coast, it will be permanently visible, until the Mariner pass within a Line drawn from Tarbetness through a point half a mile seaward of the King's Sons; when it will be intercepted from his view by the high land of the coast. The interception of the Light by the land will thus form a direction to avoid these dangerous Rocks.

dangerous Rocks. The Lantern is open or glazed seaward from S. W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W. to W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N. and is elevated 175 feet above the medium level of the sea. The Light, in clear weather, will be seen at the distance of five or six leagues, and at lesser distances, accordingly the seamant of the seamant o ing to the state of the atmosphere.
