The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THIS day His Grace George Duke of Gordon was, by command of His Majesty, sworn of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and His Grace took his place at the Board accordingly.

WHITHALL, April 8, 1830.

The King has been pleased to order a congé d'elire to pass the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, empowering the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Exeter to elect a Bishop of that See, the same being void by the translation of the Right Reverend Father in God Doctor William Carey, late Bishop thereof, to the See of St. Asaph; and His Majesty has also been pleased to recommend to the said Dean and Chapter the Right Reverend Father in God Doctor Christopher Bethell, now Bishop of Gloucester, to be by them elected Bishop of the said See of Exeter.
