ROBERT CALDER, Efq. First Captain to Admiral Sir John JERVIS, K. B. arrived this morning with dispatches from him to Mr Nepean, of which the following are copies:

SIR, Victory, in Lagos Bay, Feb. 16. The hopes of falling in with the Spanish sleet, expressed in my letter to you of the 13th instant, were confirmed that night, by our distinctly hearing the report of their signal guns, and by intelligence received from Captain Foote, of his Majesty's ship the Niger, who had, with equal judgment and perseverance, kept company with them for several days, on my prescribed rendezvous (which, from the strong south-east winds, I had never been able to reach), and that they were not more than the distance of three or four leagues from us. I anxiously awaited the dawn of day, when, being on the starboard tack, Cape St Vincent bearing East by North eight leagues, I had the satisfaction of seeing a number of ships extending from South-West to South, the wind then at West and by South. At forty-nine minutes past ten, the weather being extremely hazy, La Bonne Citoyenne made the signal that the ships seen were of the line; twenty-sive in number. His Majesty's squadron under my command, consisting of the sisteen ships of the line named in the margin*, happily formed in the most compact order of sailing, in two lines. By carrying a press of fail, I was fortunate in getting in with the enemy's sleet at half past eleven o'clock, before it had time to con-

nect, and form a regular order of battle. Such a moment was not to be lost; and, confident in the skill, valour, and discipline of the officers and men I had the happiness to command, and judging that the honour of his Majesty's arms, and the circumstances of the war in these seas required a considerable degree of enterprize, I selt myself justified in departing from the regular system; and passing through their sleet, in a line formed with the utmost celerity, tacked, and thereby separated one-third from the main body, after a partial cannonade, which prevented their rejunction till the evening; and by the very great exertions of the ships which had the good fortune to arrive up with the enemy on the larboard tack, the ships named in the margin† were captured, and the action ceased about sive o'clock in the evening.

I inclose the most correct list I have been able to obtain of the Spanish sleet opposed to me, amounting to 27 sail of the line, and an account of the killed and wounded in his Majesty's ships, as well as in those taken from the enemy. The moment the latter (almost totally dismasted) and his Majesty's ships the Captain and Culloden are in a state to put to sea, I shall avail myself of the first savourable wind to proceed off Cape St Vincent in my way to Lisbon.

Capt. Calder, whose able affiltance has greatly contributed to the public service during my command, is the bearer of this, and will more particularly describe to the Lords Commissioners of the

SIR, King's Fisher, off Oporto, Jan. 28. I beg leave to aquaint you that on the 23d inft. I fell in with two Spanish privateers; one of which, a luggar, mounting one carraige gun, and manned with thirty-eight men, I captured, and drove the other on shore between Villa Conde and Vianna; the latter was a schooner, and, I understand from the prisoners, mounted twelve carriage guns, and was manned with between fixty and seventy men: Those vessels had, for some time past, infested this coast, and had captured several English merchant vessels.
