SIR, Victory, in Lagos Bay, Feb. 16.
I inclose a letter received from Captain Marsh, of his Majesty's sloop the King's Fisher, whose services off Oporto merit my highest approbation.

SIR, King's Fisher, off Oporto, Jan. 28.
I beg leave to acquaint you that on the 23d inst. I fell in with two Spanish privateers; one of which, a luggar, mounting one carriage gun, and manned with thirty-eight men, I captured, and drove the other on shore between Villa Conde and Vianna; the latter was a schooner, and I understand from the prisoners, mounted twelve carriage guns, and was manned with between sixty and seventy men: Those vessels had, for some time past, infested this coast, and had captured several English merchant vessels.

SIR,
I Beg you will inform my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty with the arrival of his Majesty's ship Stag, under my command, at this port, and of her having captured, near Scilly, the French privateers L'Approprate brig of 14 guns and 65 men, and L'Hirondelle cutter of 6 guns and 45 men, the latter of which was destroyed.
