PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**T**HIS day the Most Noble Ulick Marquess of Clanricarde and the Right Honourable Robert Grosvenor were, by His Majesty's command, sworn of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took their respective places at the Board accordingly.

St. JAMES'S-PALACE, December 1, 1830.

This day had audience of His Majesty, the Prince de Lieven, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from the Emperor of All the Russias, to deliver his new credentials; the Prince Esterhazy, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from the Emperor of Austria, to present the Baron de Wessenberg, on a special mission from the Emperor; and the Prince de Talleyrand, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from the King of the French, to deliver a letter addressed to His Majesty by the Queen of the French; to which audiences they were respectively introduced by Lord Viscount Palmerston, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and conducted by Sir Robert Chester, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

December 2.

This day the Prince de Lieven, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from the Emperor of All the Russias, had his first audience of Her Majesty, upon delivering his new credentials to the King; to which he was introduced by Earl

Howe, Her Majesty's Lord Chamberlain, and conducted by Sir Robert Chester, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

WHITEHALL, December 1, 1830.

The King has been pleased to direct letters patent to be passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom, constituting and appointing the Right Honourable Charles Grant; Frederick John Viscount Goderich, William Viscount Melbourne, and Henry John Viscount Palmerston, His Majesty's three Principal Secretaries of State; Charles Earl Grey, First Commissioner of His Majesty's Treasury; the Right Honourable John Charles Spencer, (commonly called Viscount Althorp,) Chancellor of His Majesty's Exchequer; the Right Honourable Charles Watkin Williams Wynn; the Right Honourable John Sullivan; Sir James Macdonald, Bart.; the Right Honourable Sir James Mackintosh, Knt.; the Right Honourable Robert Grant, and Henry Ellis, Esq. His Majesty's Commissioners for the affairs of India.

December 2.

The King has been pleased to direct letters patent to be passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, constituting and appointing the Right Honourable George James Welbore Agar Ellis, William Dacres Adams, and Henry Dawkins, Esqrs. to be Commissioners of His Majesty's Woods, Forests, and Land Revenues.

December 3.

The King has been pleased to grant the office of His Majesty's Advocate for Scotland to Francis Jeffrey, Esq. Dean of the Faculty of Advocates of Scotland.

The King has also been pleased to grant the office of Solicitor-General for Scotland to Henry Cockburn, Esq.

*Office of the Lord Chamberlain to the Queen, St. James's, December 2, 1830.*

The Queen has been pleased to appoint Sir Mathew John Tierney, Bart. Physician to Her Majesty's Household.

*At the Court of St. James's, November 30, 1830:*

The King, as Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, has been graciously pleased, by letters patent under His royal sign-manual, and the great seal of the Order, bearing date the 25th day of November instant, to dispense with all the statutes and regulations usually observed with regard to Installation, and to give and grant unto the Most Noble John Duke of Bedford, Knight-Elect of the said Most Noble Order, and duly invested with the ensigns thereof, full power and authority to exercise all rights and privileges belonging to a Knight Companion of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, in as full and ample a manner as if his Grace had been formally installed; any decree, rule, or usage to the contrary notwithstanding.

FOREIGN-OFFICE, November 30, 1830.

The King has been pleased to approve of Thomas Power, Esq. as Consul for the Emperor of Russia at Gibraltar.
